PROGRAM REPORT





CityHive is based on the unceded, ancestral, and traditional territories of the xwməθkwəýəm (Musqueam), Skwxwú7mesh (Squamish), and səlilwətał (Tsleil-Waututh) Nations.

We acknowledge and are grateful to the Semiahmoo, Katzie, Kwikwetlem, Kwantlen, Qayqayt, and Tsawwassen First Nations, on whose land the City of Surrey currently resides.

We use the term 'unceded' in land acknowledgements because it signifies that there was never any agreement between the local First Nations and Colonial Governments. As this program inherently dealt with land and land use, it is important to recognize that the land that we were working with, while technically under the jurisdiction of the City of Surrey, belong to the local first nations of the Semiahmoo, Katzie, Kwikwetlem, Kwantlen, Qayqayt, and Tsawwassen First Nations. We were grateful to be able to learn and grow together on these incredible lands and territories.

Throughout the program, two questions that continued to resurface were "What does it mean to have 'public space' on unceded lands?" as well as "What is public space, and whom is it designed for?" These are questions that we invite you to consider as you read through this report and encourage you to bring them into your conversations about public space in B.C. and across Canada going forward.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Surrey Shapers: Public Space (Surrey Shapers) program was a 3-month long cohort program for youth ages 18-30 who live, work, or learn in the City of Surrey, B.C. The program was designed to follow CityHive's knowledge-to-action framework, supporting youth to activate their local public spaces, as well as increase their understanding of civic governance and decision-making.

Some of the guiding questions for the program were:

- 1. How are public spaces designed? And who are they designed for?
- 2. What does it mean to interact with public space on unceded lands?
- 3. How can we create inclusive and active spaces that reflect our personal stories?


Surrey Shapers was our second cohort engaged in a public space activation project with the City of Surrey. The Surrey Shapers cohort consisted of 10 sessions between November 2022 and February 2023, with two weeks off at the end of December for the holidays. The cohort was facilitated by two co-leads, with two mentor-facilitators brought in to share their own specialised knowledge and expertise. Throughout the program, a variety of guest speakers were invited to speak on important themes and issues related to public space, project planning, communications, and other key skills. These guest speakers included City of Surrey staff, nonprofit managers, professors, communications professionals, and urban planners. The latter half of the program consisted of 'action sessions,' where the cohort formed groups to investigate public space in Surrey and develop a project that would activate the chosen area and engage Surrey residents.

This report outlines the success and challenges that the Surrey Shapers cohort faced, as well as lessons learned by the CityHive team. Furthermore, recommendations for future iterations of Surrey Shapers, or similar programs, are provided to improve CityHive programming for the next cohort of youth.

Surrey Shapers is a unique, cohort-based learning experience for young adults that fills a much-needed space in Surrey. This document highlights the existing strengths of the cohort to carry on future work while naming challenges to work through in further iterations of this program or other cohorts related to youth interested in civic engagement.



PROGRAM OVERVIEW

CityHive's knowledge-to-action framework guides participants through an experiential learning process.

Knowledge

- Build knowledge of how local government operates, including jurisdiction, decision-making, and levers for change
- Bring youth together to create connections across educational, professional, and/or cultural silos through creative and experiential project development and learning together
- Develop a cross-cultural understanding of varied lived experiences and how they relate to individual and collective experiences of public space



- Build a set of tools and skills through the transformation of an existing public space to better understand their role in changing future spaces to create a city that better reflects them
- Create opportunities for youth in the program to tell their own stories and express their own identities through their action projects and within the program, as well as the stories associated with the land and place on which the program takes place (both recent/documented histories and oral/ancestral narratives)


